

St. Francis Xavier, St. Damien, St. Thérèse of Lisieux, and St. Oscar Romero - Pray for Us!






Missionary Updates

We have been working on making an accessible directory of missionaries who are from and who serve our Diocese. The directory will contain short term missionaries (Benedictine Community Volunteers), long term missionaries, deceased missionaries, and retired/returned missionaries. Since 1927, the year the Society for the Propagation of the Faith was established here, we have been a diamond in the rough, with a large number of foreign missioners from our Diocese. 
World Mission Rosaries 2019:



Onamia, Minnesota – December 22, 2019

Christmas Greetings Beth, Amy, Gretchen, Guy, Victoria, and Jerry, This first day of winter surprised us today here in Onamia with 32 degree temps on a bright but very white scene. This contrast with tropical Papua made my return a week ago from my thirty-three day journey to

Indonesia seem much longer ago. Participation at a five-day cultural festival and the Golden Jubilee of the Diocese of Agats graced me with many reconnections with literally hundreds of people I knew

from years ago. Strangely, however, three weeks before arriving there, news broke out, even on Facebook, that I had died. At the Golden Jubilee I met my "sister," Dorothea, (pictured with the headband to the

right), from the village of Amborep where I did my pastoral internship 1974-1976. Her parents adopted me as their son. Dorothea told me that when the news arrived about my death, the

villagers began wailing and she threw off all her clothes and rolled in the mud just as her elders did years ago to express their grief. Later they did learn from the Crosiers in Agats that the death news was false. Fortunately in that world, if a person has been declared dead but really is alive, that person will have a really long life.

Five of us journeyed to Papua together. (Picture at the Crosier monastery—L-R Guy Wagner, the son of my cousin Susan (Petermeier) and Miles Wagner in Hawaii; I; Beth Neville, the director of the mission office in St. Cloud; Amy Mickelson and Gretchen Burau, two art history professors from St. Thomas University which has the largest collection of Asmat artifacts in the U.S.)

One of our most precious events in Asmat land was a cultural conversation with grades 3-6 of the Sawa Catholic elementary school. Professor Gretchen asked the Sawa students [through me as interpreter] the same questions she had asked the students of St. Peter Claver elementary school in Minneapolis. For instance, "What do you do after school hours?" or "What is your favorite game." We hope to spawn a conversation bridging hemispheres, tribes and races, all toward building our global family. When proposing questions for their American school friends, one Asmat student asked, "On what island is your country?" These conversations are filmed so that eventually the students will be able to see one another. Poor internet connections and time differences prevented live streaming of the Sawa event.

May you be having a good Christmas celebration and great entry into a hope-filled New Year. May you find God as the more clearly present Emmanuel, touching your life in many simple ways, including the playful touch of this Asmat babe with Beth (below) in the Asmat village of Syuru, after a Sunday Eucharist.

One of the most memorable experiences I had was going to the villages of Sawa-Erma. During this short (and hot) trip inland, I was able to see new canoes being carved and decorated for the annual cultural festival. We interviewed a master carver about the future of Asmat art and saw the boats being launched for the first time. Before heading back down river, I was able to purchase two woven mats and baby carrier for the American Museum of Art. - Gretchen
